BLAINE LUGTEN LEAVES LASTING IMPRESSION DURING ENTERTAINING COMMENCEMENT SPEECH

On Thursday, May 22, Hamilton High School math teacher Blaine Lugten delivered a commencement speech the Class of 2025—and the entire Hawkeye community—won't soon forget. With a blend of heartfelt advice, humor, and show-stopping performances, Lugten took the stage at graduation not just as an educator, but as an entertainer, mentor, and proud Hamilton alum.

The veteran teacher—who is retiring after 29 years at Hamilton and 35 years in education—used his commencement address to inspire graduates in a way only he could: through music. From dancing to AC/DC to belting out Sweet Caroline, from leading the Hamilton fight song to a customized rendition of John Denver's Country Roads, Lugten had the entire gymnasium clapping, laughing, and cheering.

"There are multiple times when you'll fail," Lugten said early in his speech. "Dust yourself off, and get back into the game. I want you to go out and find your passion." That passion for him, he explained, has always been music—and he proved it.

As students and guests smiled and laughed, Lugten launched into a Hamilton-themed version of Country Roads:

"The hum of tractors all around me, just a small town in Allegan County..."


He gave shoutouts to familiar local landmarks—from the town's iconic trestle to its long-awaited stoplight—before ending with an emotional message to the Class of 2025: "So go and find your passion... But as you're looking back, please remember this town will always be your home."

The performance instantly took off across social media, earning thousands of interactions, with comments flooding in from current students, alumni, and community members praising Lugten's legacy and unique send-off. The video was even picked up by local media, cementing the moment as a standout highlight of the school year. Way to go, Mr. Lugten!

AGSCIENCE DAY INTRODUCES 8TH GRADERS TO AGRICULTURE & ANIMAL SCIENCE CAREERS



Hamilton Community Schools recently hosted AgScience Day — a hands-on, educational event introducing 8th grade students to the wide world of agriculture and animal science. The experience, filled with excitement and exploration, gave students a deeper look into the many careers and skills connected to agriculture, a major industry in the Hamilton area.

"We're doing an agriculture day, so we get to learn about animals and farms and all that stuff," said 8th grade student Joelle. "It's amazing!"

Throughout the day, students rotated through various stations where they could interact with animals, try their hand at veterinary skills, learn how animal feeds are made, and explore careers in farming, transportation, and more. One student mentioned having experience working with horses on a farm, but still found the behind-the-scenes demonstrations eye-opening and valuable.

"I was really excited for today," said 8th grade student Addalyn. "I've done work around this, but it's great to see different perspectives. Everyone does things a little differently, and it's nice to see what they think and how they do it."

Community members, local farmers, and agricultural professionals partnered with the school to help students connect what they learn in the classroom with real-life applications and future opportunities.

It's amazing what Hamilton is doing with exposing kids to trades," said Brandon of Brink Farms. "Not all students are going to college, and that's okay — we're helping them see what else is out there. Agriculture is huge in this area."

AgScience Day wasn't just about information — it was about inspiration. Whether it was learning how cows are now milked robotically, exploring the use of smart collars, or simply interacting with animals up close, students were immersed in meaningful, hands-on learning that expanded their view of what's possible.

"We live in an agricultural community," added Jeff of Hoeve Farms. "And as generations move further from the farm, it's important we bridge that gap. This day helps students understand what's happening around them and consider careers that are vital to our community."

From farming to veterinary work, transportation to food production, AgScience Day showcased the many ways students can get involved in the industries that fuel West Michigan and beyond.

"This is amazing," a student said with a smile. "It's a change of pace, we're out of the classroom, learning hands-on — it's awesome!"

JOB SHADOW DAY PROVIDES CAREER EXPLORATION FOR 7th - 10th GRADE STUDENTS

SALMON IN THE CLASSROOM BECOMES AN INSTANT HIT AT BLUE STAR ELEMENTARY

For the first time ever, Blue Star Elementary's fourth-grade class capped off their Salmon in the Classroom experience with a day of fishing on Lake Michigan. Thanks to the Big Red Foundation and 14 local charter boats and first mates, 40 students hit the water and brought in over 100 fishincluding a 15-pound and a 22-pound trout.

Salmon in the Classroom, a Michigan DNR program, teaches students about ecosystems and conservation by letting them raise salmon from egg to smolt. The students even had a chance to release their salmon into Bear Creek and the Kalamazoo River in early May. The fishing experience on May 28 tied the whole experience together.

"Many of these kids had never been on a boat or gone fishing," said Big Red Foundation board member and captain Mark Rapson. "This is something they'll remember forever."

Teachers saw the day as a full-circle moment. "They raised the salmon and learned the science," said Mr. Szczcerowski. "Now they see the 'why." Fourth grade teacher Ms. Jes Ruch-Guerrin added, "We're incredibly thankful to the Big Red Foundation. This wouldn't have happened without them."

One student summed it up best: "I've never been fishing before... it was new, fun, and now I love it!"

WORK BEGINS ON THE HAMILTON HIGH SCHOOL PHYSICAL EDUCATION REDESIGN



Thanks to support from the Hamilton community and the 2023 bond, work has begun on the Physical Education classroom redesign bond scope — featuring a brand new weight room and wrestling room that promise to elevate the student experience both academically and athletically. The transformation comes after years of making do with an undersized weight room, often forcing staff to cap Strength and Movement classes and turn students away due to space constraints. Despite those limitations, students never complained — instead, they continued to show up and work hard in tight quarters, often extending into hallways for workouts.

"The students have made the most of what we've had," said physical education teacher, Dan Van Hekken. "But I don't think they fully realize how incredible this new space is going to be. This was long overdue and I can't wait to see their reactions."

With approximately 70% of Hamilton High School's 800 students using the weight room throughout their time at HHS, the new facility couldn't come at a better time. The updated space more than doubles the previous size and includes 15 workout stations — up from eight in the previous space — as well as the latest equipment and expanded features for both athletic and personal development.

Much of the design and equipment selection came through the collaborative efforts of Van Hekken and Athletic Director Eric Talsma, who led a strategic planning process that included touring several high school and collegiate weight rooms throughout West Michigan. Their goal was to create a space that met Hamilton's unique needs — selecting each piece of equipment with intention to best support student-athletes and physical education classes.

We've got five single half racks, five double half racks, a 20-foot wide by 18-yard long turf section, four different cable machines, kettlebell and dumbbell storage, and even a 16-foot low bridge with J squat," said Talsma. "This isn't just an upgrade — it's a complete transformation that will allow us to increase participation, efficiency, and ultimately student growth."

The new weight room provides more than just physical benefits. For many students, weightlifting is a key part of their routine — not only for sports but for their mental health and overall well-being.

"We have a lot of students over the years that have added weight lifting as part of their day because they enjoy the mental health aspect of it," said Principal Mitch Bosch. "They enjoy getting out and being active."

"I think it's going to be a great space," said junior Joselyn Paskvan. "A new weight room doesn't automatically make better athletes, but it will provide a space where we can make a decision to get better."

"It'll be a lot more efficient," added junior Brett Schrotenboer. "We'll have more stations and a better rotation system for everyone to get stronger together."

In tandem with the new weight room, the existing space is being repurposed into an updated wrestling room.


From students to administrators, the message is clear: this is a win for all of Hamilton High School.

"We're just so grateful," said Talsma. "This is only possible because of our community's trust and investment in our students. Thank you for making this happen — we're proud to be Hawkeyes."

Work in both the weight room and wrestling room will be completed by August 2025 and ready for the 2025-26 school year.



Porter, already working in plumbing, sees the CDL as a backup plan and added skill for the future. Hayden hopes to deliver heavy equipment to local farms.

"I wasn't really expecting to be able to do this while still in school," Eli said. "But it's nice to have it before I even graduate high school."

All four seniors expressed deep appreciation for the donors who helped fund their classes, tests, and training-an investment that gives students a valuable credential and real-world experience before even walking across the graduation stage.

"The donors really helped us out," said Hayden. "It's a huge advantage at a young age and puts us in a better spot for the future."

The CDL program is just one of many career-focused opportunities available to Hamilton students, preparing them to be workforce-ready, confident, and adaptable. As Max summed it up: "Hamilton has gotten me ready for the future by giving me this opportunity."

Thanks to continued community support and student determination, the Hamilton CDL program is paving a strong path forward—one mile marker at a time.

2015 HAMILTON GRADUATE GRANT WOLFRAM MAKES MAJOR LEAGUE DEBUT WITH THE BALTIMORE ORIOLES

For 2015 Hamilton High School graduate Grant Wolfram, Saturday, April 26 was a dream years in the making — and one that came full circle in a way he could have never scripted.

Wolfram, a left-handed pitcher for the Baltimore Orioles, after being traded from the Milwaukee Brewers just weeks prior, made his Major League Baseball debut at Comerica Park against the Detroit Tigers — the very team he grew up rooting for, and the organization that originally drafted him out of high school in 2015.

"It was funny, my parents were joking about it, like my dad said, 'Oh, we'll see you in Detroit this weekend," Wolfram laughed. "It's just crazy how you're literally a phone call away."

The call came unexpectedly after seven long years in the minor leagues.



"I haven't been pitching the best, so I wasn't expecting it, but it comes when you least expect it," he said. "They called me up and I was like, oh my goodness, they're in Detroit. It's a crazy world we live in."

Making the moment even more special for Wolfram was the chance to step onto the mound at Comerica Park — a place where he had cheered on his childhood heroes and made memories, including being in the stands for Miguel Cabrera's 300th career home run.

"It was an awesome experience to be able to debut in Comerica Park," he said. "It was a full-circle moment for me because they drafted me out of high school, I grew up a Tigers fan, and to finally pitch in the majors — and it just happened to be in Detroit — it made that even more special, for sure."

The special connections didn't stop there. Working the centerfield camera for the broadcast that day was another Hamilton High School graduate: Michael Berens, a 1991 alum.

"I didn't know that until afterward, and when I saw it, I was like wow, what are the odds of that?" Wolfram said. "It was really cool and an amazing experience. It was a blur for me, I had so much going on."

Both Wolfram and Berens share another unique link — they were students of longtime Hamilton Elementary teacher Lynn Bosch, who taught them in first grade.

"Everybody is so excited for Grant and that he's made his dream come true," said Bosch during an interview with WZZM News. "He's been patient and working hard and I think the same thing, pretty much for Michael. I mean, I think it's a dream come true for him, too, to be so involved in all of that. So everybody's excited in our community. They're all pumped."

Reflecting on his journey, Wolfram is quick to credit the community that raised him, many of which were in the stands on that Saturday night to watch him make his debut.

"I wouldn't be there if it wasn't for my coaches, teachers, and mentors," he said. "I love all of the support. I will need some more going forward. The journey is just beginning at the major league level."

Growing up in a tight-knit town like Hamilton, Wolfram knows firsthand the strength of small-town support.

"Coming from Hamilton, it's a small town and word travels fast," he said. "It's a great support system and a connected family. It's a great place to raise a family, for sure. I had a lot of people reach out — it was a great place to grow up."

Now, with his first major league outing under his belt and his dreams just beginning to unfold, Grant Wolfram carries his Hawkeye pride — and the support of an entire community — with him on the biggest stage in baseball.


